Our new PSC committee member,
Andrew Merlot, is a Sailing Australia
National Equipment Auditor; a race
official qualified to conduct safety
audits. The Australian Sailing Racing
Rules and Special Regulations
describe boat owner responsibilities
as: to establish uniform minimum
equipment, accommodation and
training standards for racing boats.
The Special Regulations are also a
guide for cruising boats and PSC has
adopted the Special Regulations
(Category 5) as the standard required
for club cruising events.

As PSC needs to improve in this area, the committee is adopting an approach of education first, enforcement later. The club will help boat owners by providing support and information, beginning with an online a seminar

via Zoom, at on Tuesday 21st of September at 7PM.

Throughout the seminar, Andy will guide boat owners through their responsibilities under the Australian Sailing Special Regulations and answer any questions that members may have regarding what steps are needed in order to get up their boats up to requirements. As Covid restrictions ease, we will be hosting additional information nights which will be held at the club for further support.

The committee **highly recommends** that all owners of trailerable yachts attend this seminar as further into the season boats will be audited and non-compliant boats may be disqualified from racing or from participating in club cruising events.

And in order to promote participation in club events we will be offering a **discount** on boat storage fees for each event a boat participates in. - 2% discount per cruise event
- 5% discount per working bee, Sunday Racing or OOD
- The maximum deduction is 30%
- If no working bees are attended the maximum deduction is 20%
- If only one working bee is attended then the maximum deduction is 25%

Last season we switched things up and moved to a new results system called *ClubOps* (which runs the Sailor App). Understandably so, with our race results so readily available, we have had a lot of questions about how handicapping works. Hopefully this article will explain the handicap system in a manner that is easy to understand!

The first type of results you may see is **based off elapsed time**, and due to our fleet's speed varying so significantly we do not typically publish these results. But in a nutshell, it means: the first boat to cross the finish line, takes the win. You can think of this one a bit like who gets to Hobart first in the Sydney to Hobart; typically one of the Super Maxi's!

Secondly, we have **yardstick**; you may see yardstick in the *Gough Strain Outsider Series* at PSC. These results are based on the theoretical performance of the boat, rather than the skipper's sailing potential. These yardsticks are based off what *Australian Sailing* publish annually under **Class Basic Handicap (CBH).** The formula for CBH (this includes trailerables and sportsboats) is a system which uses a series of measurements of the hull and rig of a boat to provide even, and fair racing. Therefore, racing success is primarily determined by the skills of the crew.

A great way of thinking about this is if you compare it to the *Tattersall Cup* in the Sydney to Hobart, where the elapsed time and handicap are combined; giving a "corrected time". Example: if a Super Maxi needs to beat a 31 footer by three days, but they are only two and a half days ahead, then that means the 31 footer is considered the winner

Lastly, we have **handicap**. These results are based on the performance of a boat's previous five races on a rolling average. These results can be seen in the *Club Champion/Wendy Searle Series*. They aim to compare how well the crew does in a particular race compared to how well they have been doing in the past. You can view the settings currently calculating these handicaps in the image a the top of this article. In order to win on handicap, our best advise is that you must sail consistently and sail well.

As per the Club Captain's report, we have revamped the sailing schedule this season to make things simpler and easier to understand. This new schedule will reward those that turn up, sail consistently and provide a general sense of continuity throughout the season.

Faster weekend

THE REGATTA YOU CANNOT MISS

his year was the the 59th Yachting
Western Victoria Easter Regatta,
and not ones to ever miss out on a
sailing holiday, the Stuchbery's made their
annual pilgrimage down to Lake Bullen
Merri at Camperdown, Victoria. And this
year they were joined by the Condor family
who took the ILCA and the RS 500. As for
the Stuchbery's boats...well, miraculously,
they only brought one! The Thompson 590
that is well known to most members.

Day one was a hot and very light northerly. Lake Bullen Merri is an ancient clover leaf shaped lake formed by two overlapping maar volcanoes with a depth of 66 meters. When the breeze comes rushing down the walls of the crater, it can be a bit of a challenge to race, particularly in light, shifty northerly winds. It was a day of tactical racing that was truly enjoyed by all.>

Day two produced an intensifying northwesterly breeze with gusts that might have reached 30 knots as they funnelled down the crater. The most memorable part of the day aboard the Thompson was doing a consistent 15.7 to 16.5 knots of boat speed down the northern shore of the lake under masthead spinnaker. To put just how windy it was into perspective -even with our crew weight 145kg over the 220kg maximum specified by designer Steve Thompson—we were actively dumping both main and the number two jib constantly simply to keep the boat on her feet upwind. All the while another sports boat just in front of us got knocked completely flat, with her spreaders in the water.

Day three greeted us with both chocolate and a cooler southerly breeze. Due to the local geography and the stability of a dense southerly in Western Victoria, it made for extremely enjoyable racing conditions. Racing was incredibly tactical, with plenty of passing lanes available both up and downwind.

Day four is always reserved for the Jack Lane Memorial Sternchaser. The Sternchaser's start times are based on the results of the previous races. The course is a one lap sprint around the lake, which means the slower boats are often on the final beat by the time the faster boats start, so often the winner is a boat from somewhere in the mid-fleet,











I regard this particular race as one of the most challenging to win in yachting; you could commission a "Bullen Merri specific yacht," from a world famous designer, and spend four years training full time at Camperdown and yet still finish mid fleet!

On the day, the southerly breeze had backed round to the south-east. Onboard the Thompson we started nearly last. As expected this was a great challenging race race, with big lulls and a lot of tactical decisions required. Fortunately, we were able to and make up a few positions in order to finish mid-fleet.

This regatta is an absolute must do for any sailor and family. It has it all! The coziness and beautiful scenery of camping alongside the lake, the epic storytelling around the campfire, dark skies to assist you on a satellite or shooting star hunt just before the moon pops up over the silhouetted hills and much more!

Hopefully, you and your family are able to make your way along to the 60th year of *Yachting Western Victoria* running an epic Easter Regatta in 2022,






AUTHOR RON CLARK

LOCKDOWN PROJECT #3


After impulsively purchasing an old Moth at the start of last season, I found myself totally addicted to Moth sailing once again. Late April saw me standing in the corner of the yard at Royal Geelong Yacht Club looking at yet another Moth. This one featured a Thorpe hull, CST rig and custom foils; all things that are a slight upgrade to my old boat.


My friend, who happened to be the owner of this boat pictured on the right, had offered to sell it to me as his calendar was full with other sailing commitments. I later found out it was also originally owned by a previous world champion, so I felt like it represents astonishing bang for buck, which I obviously couldn't go past.

I picked up my new boat in early May and managed to sail it once before we were plunged into another lockdown. I then got to sail it once more, in early June, in a rapidly fading breeze, before we went into the current lockdown we find ourselves in. Like any sailor that finds themselves unable to sail, I took this opportunity of being stuck at home as a means to try and get the boat to a reliable and as ergonomic as possible. Essentially, I pulled it all apart and put it back together again; addressing any issues I found along the way.


The new modifications include a new vang, new custom ride height adjuster (designed by Jacob), restitched trampolines, new control line take ups, custom universal tiller universal joint, higher forestay position and more. I can't wait to get it back out on the water!





















The boatbuilder also addressed the shot deck and cracked rudder. And since bringing the boat to Portarlington the rig has been painted, the deck gear replaced and new running rigging was fitted.

With less than 26cm of LOA and 80kg of displacement separating *Workers Playtime* and the reigning Long Race Champion—Garry Fair's Sonata 8—Sea Ya it will certainly be interesting to see how the upcoming season pans out at PSC. Both yachts were designed by the notable USA based America's Cup designers in their prime; Sea ya by Gary Mull and *Workers Playtime* by Doug Peterson. With so little to seperate these boats on paper, the overall results will come down to tactics and boat speed. I'm confident we'll see both in the top five or six by the end of the season, but only time will tell.

Please slow down to a walking pace through these parts as we do not want members of the greater community to perceive PSC in a negative light or even worse, for an accident to occur, thank you.


